ECCO is a group of musicians — colleagues and friends from leading conservatories and music festivals across the country — who play together as a self-conducted chamber orchestra. Formed in 2001, ECCO is comprised of some of today's most vibrant and gifted young string players: soloists, chamber musicians, principals of major American orchestras, and Grammy winners, who play with the symphony orchestras of Philadelphia, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Chicago, and Boston among others. ECCO released its first commercial recording in 2012, which includes Tchaikovsky's Serenade for Strings in C Major Op. 48, Shostakovich's Chamber Symphony in C Minor, Op. 110a and "La Follia" Variations for String Orchestra, arranged by ECCO's own Michi Wiancko. ECCO's 2012–2013 season included debuts at the Krannert Center for Performing Arts and Princeton's University Concerts, as well as return visits to the Skaneateles Festival, the Philadelphia Chamber Music Society, the Peoples' Symphony Concerts, and Union College Concerts.
